
What are the big differences between the (2nd half of the) 20th Century and the 21st Century?

- Attention span has decreased
- Now more an entertainer than a teacher
 - IT and Internet
 - Social Media
- From chalk to white boards and smart boards
- Parents are too involved in school (need to justify teaching)
 - Gender diversity fluidity
 - Gap between state-of-art appearance and old methods
 - Student-centered in stead of chalk n talk
 - Access to information
 - Autonomous learning
 - Less lecturer more facilitator
 - Responsible for personal life of students
 - Can now use many different methods and approaches
- Decrease teacher authority and focus on students' needs
